It is with great regret the Parochial Church Council has to confirm that, for personal reasons our Vicar, Ted Duckett is taking early retirement. It is with very great sadness that we see Ted and Irene leave Bassingbourn and Whaddon. We wish them well for the future. Please note that services will continue regularly at 9.15 am.

Renovation of the Church will soon be finished. We shall have a chancel that is wind and watertight, work undertaken and paid for by the Church Commissioners, who are Lay Rectors of St Mary's, Whaddon, a role which gives them the responsibility for upkeep and repair to the chancel. At the same time, the PCC are using funds from the Fabric Fund Account to stabilise, renovate the lime wash the plasterwork in the nave. The result should ensure our church stands in good condition in the centre of Whaddon for many years to come.

#### PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Monday 25th March at 8pm.

Over the last months many topics have been discussed at Council Meetings as well as various planning applications. Plans for two new houses opposite Town Farm farmyard were approved.

#### Trees

We have had mixed weather recently but the frost and snow did not prevent gallant helpers turning out over two weekends to plant the second stage off the hedging along the Whaddon Gap Road. Thank you to everyone who came. We now have over 400 metres of mixed hedging all beginning to grow well.

The first phase of the Woodland planned of Whaddon will begin to be planted on Saturday 9th March. This is an area of 3 1/2 - 4 acres to be planted on Mr Capon's land leading off the bridle way that runs towards Wimpole Hall.

A footpath will go through the wood along the stream to the Whaddon Gap Road, where a further 1 1/2 - 2 acres of trees will be planted as phase two. It will be necessary - in order to attract maximum grant aid - to have small area for parking cars here. Further paths will lead back into Whaddon.

#### Traffic

Please drive carefully signs have been erected at either end of the village. Residents in bridge Street are still seriously concerned about the amount and speed with which traffic uses their road. The footpath between Church Street and Meldreth Road is now in place.

#### Village Hall

The Village Hall has undergone major work to the kitchen and internal decoration. Outside painting awaits better weather. Before finishing the flooring in the extension the problem of damp needs to be resolved. The Parish Council and Village Hall Committee are extremely grateful to Mr Clive Hough for his survey and advice on this difficulty.
