PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

At the Parish Council Meeting in November, Mr Terry Allison was nominated for the position of Chairman. It was a unanimous choice and Mr Allison said he hoped to be a worthy successor to Fred Bradley.

The Stream

The Parish Council is pleased to have moved a little closer to completing one of Mr Bradley's initiatives. At the January meeting a decision was made to accept the estimate from the Environment Agency for construction of an adjustable "V" match weir for positioning in the stream at the end of Bridge Street, where the stream divides so that the flows are properly apportioned.

Landscaping

There was also a good response to the request for ideas for landscaping the pump in Bridge Street in memory of Fred. This will be the next project once the hedge and tree planting are out of the way. Meanwhile thank you to all who responded.

The last 25 metres of the hedge along the Whaddon Gap Road have been planted and the whole length of two years worth of planting has been weeded and pruned. We can record an excellent rate of plants "taking". By the time this newsletter is received the trees will also have been planted with the help of the County Council Rural Group. Thank you everyone in Whaddon who gave up time to come along and help in February.

The Village History

A short Village History is also underway. This is an updating of a document which was regularly given out to newcomers on arrival in the village. The new version will be circulated to all villagers shortly.



The oak leaf on the village sign signifies the traditional singing of the Whitsun song. A group of young men would gather together and proceed around the village giving everyone a sprig of oak to display on the roof or eaves of their house. Popular belief has it that the oak came from the tree in the churchyard. This would be done on the Saturday before Whit Monday. On Whit Monday itself the group would actually stop at each house to sing the Whitsun song, much as carol singers do at Christmas. The song had five verses and during the last verse they would wave yet another sprig above their heads. Householders were invited to reward the singers with money which was collected and taken to the village pub where open house was declared. This meant that all comers could have a "free" drink. The tradition in Whaddon died out before the last pub, the Queen Adelaide, closed its doors. The last known performance was in 1937 when Albert and Jack Smith demonstrated the song at the village celebrations for King George VI. This was by popular request because the practise of going around the village had ceased before that. Albert Smith lived in Bridge Street in one of the terrace of cottages now known as Jarmans and No. 68. His son Charles married a local girl, Hilda, and went to live at Dyers Green now The White Cottage. Their daughter, Bessie, still lives in Whaddon and she has given me a copy of the words to the song as written by Hilda. Jack Smith, Albert's brother, lived at Homestead, The Green, Meldreth Road now Wisteria Cottage. To perform properly the men would wear a top hat with a white scarf tied around it. The origins of the practice are, unfortunately, lost in time.



Most residents of Whaddon seem to enjoy birdwatching both in their gardens and around the village. We seem to be blessed with a particularly attractive and varied variety of bird life. Have you, though, been aware of changing trends in your feathered visitors over the years? The British Trust for Ornithology has been monitoring bird populations for many years and large declines have been noted in many common song birds. One of the methods they have recently introduced is having people note the birds that visit their gardens and keep records which are then collected and analysed by the Trust. Of the many species that have been declining the Song Thrush has shown one of the greatest drops in number, about 65% over 20 years. The reason is known, many birds do not survive their first winter, but the cause remains a mystery. One possible reason is the loss of food; the Thrush is the only predator of snails and if their numbers fall (more use of pellets etc. loss of weedy patches and waste ground) the birds are forced into competition with other species for different types of food i.e. worms. Apparently Thrushes do not do well in competition being less aggressive birds. Information is patchy and no proper explanations have so far been established. I have more information and details of how you can help if you would like to ring me. There are many interesting findings already emerging from these surveys. 207219.
