




Whaddon Childrens Christmas Party

SUMMER EVENTS

The Village Hall Committee organised two of our events again this year, and the Parochial Church Council another.

We began in June with the Village Fete. Lovely weather and very hard work by the organisers combined to give a substantial crowd a most enjoyable and entertaining afternoon. Many of the usual side-shows were there with a few new ones. The W.I. served cream teas outside this year, ably abetted by two young waitresses. They all worked very hard and I'm sure those who partook of the feast enjoyed sitting in the sun. The licensed bar also did a roaring trade. Helpers and fete goers alike managed to eat all the chips we had at the Barbeque! For the first time a car boot sale was held in conjunction with the fete and this added to the variety of goods for sale and boosted the takings as well. A total of £669 was raised, which will be used to improve the facilities at the hall and recreation ground.

There was the possibility of seeing immediate benefits at the Village Barbeque. This is fast becoming the 'one not to miss' in this area, and a well-deserved reputation that is. The feasters this year were able to see the new covered terrace in use for the first time. The group, Black Velvet, entertained us all night from its shelter. Special thanks must go to Russell Wigg, Terry Allison, Steven Wilson and Lionel Pinner for pulling out all the stops to ensure that it was finished in time. The food on offer was magnificent, a tribute to all those unsung cooks in the village, and it was accompanied by a well-stocked bar. Thanks also to the chefs on the night who cooked the meat course. Money raised on that occasion was £451.

The Church Fete was again held at the Old Vicarage, thanks to Lord and Lady Whaddon. A large contingent of their guests swelled the numbers attending, ensuring a good crowd. Stephen Chambers from Anglia Television opened the show and brought along his wife and four children. Unfortunately the drought and a cold June, coupled with a slightly earlier date, meant that entries to the fruit and vegetable show were slightly down, but the quality remained high. All items were auctioned off as usual at the end of the fete, and the grand sum of £1,670 was made in total to help with the upkeep of our lovely old church. Thanks go to the PCC and all their helpers who gave us all yet another lovely day, with all the sideshows and games.



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parish Council meetings are held every two months. The inaugural meeting of the new Council was held on 13th May. Mr Ken Green was elected Chairman.

Over the summer, among other issues, the stream, letting houses in Ridgeway Close, preventing dog fouling and changing the post code have been discussed. A planning application from Melform has been viewed, and a renewal application reveived for Whaddon Golf Range, in relation to which there has also been discussion about the bank of soil on the boundary.

Work to dig out a section of the stream at the southerly end of Bridge Street has taken place.

It is felt that villagers requiring council housing in the village may not be making their needs known to the Parish Council. If parishioners, who are already on the council waiting list are interested in accommodation in Ridgeway Close, please let Janice Pettitt, Clerk to the Parish Council, know.

Complaints about dog fouling on the paths and grass verges have reached the Parish Council. The maximum penalty for this offence is a £700.00 fine. Apart from being illegal and exceedingly unpleasant, dog faeces present a very real health threat for both young and old – that of toxicariasis. Councillors are keen that the byelaw should be upheld and use made of the fine.

Villagers can look to P.C. Dean, who has Whaddon as part of his special responsibility, along with other villages in the area. Madge Compton has been appointed as Liaison Councillor between the village and the police. She can be contacted on 207 718.

Less clear cut is the issue of changing the post code. 28 villagers gave their views concerning changing the post code from SG8 to CB2. Those in favour: 14, and 14 voted against.

Finally, two campaigns are afoot: firstly the Council hopes that notice will be taken of the petition raised to ask for gritting of the Whaddon roads in icy conditions to be re-established. Secondly, although turned down in the past, the Council will continue to press for a footpath to be created, linking the two halves of the village: Church Street with the Meldreth Road end.

Wherever you live in Whaddon, remember that Parish Council meetings are open to the public, with time at the end of each meeting for villagers to make their points of view known. Do come and support us.

WILDLIFE IN WHADDON

Bird notes from Ken Green

Autumn has come to the village now, and whilst field cultivation has been in progress wheatears have been seen on their migration; also there are several golden plovers flying with the ordinary black and white 'peewits'. In the trees around the green there are several families of longtailed tits and blue tits feeding together on the insects, building up fat for the winter. Ann and Brian Williams, for a second year, have been host to a family of great tits that chose their outside letterbox as a suitable nesting site from which to raise their fledglings. The old trees in the area continue to provide a good environment for the owls, and this year has obviously been a good breeding season for them, judging by the chorus of wheezes, clicks and hisses in the evenings. Conversely, the swallows have had a less successful season, not many returning this year to breed successfully. There are many magpies around and the conservationists will have to face this problem soon, as these predators continue to threaten garden birds of all sizes through the whole season.
