

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Unfortunately Whaddon has once more lost our Community Beat Officer. Constant operational pressures mean that Community Policing merits low on priorities. We must count ourselves fortunate that this is a low crime area statistically hence our lack of routine police cover. Until a P.C. is appointed Sat. Poppitt will maintain cover of the village. He stresses that he is not a replacement because he continues to be based at Sawston supervising several community beats. However if you have any Policing concerns which you would prefer to speak to a Police Officer about he would be pleased to hear from you (01223 358966 and ask for him by name).

I have some timely tips to pass on in preventing crime:-

Firework safety (not crime, but timely!). Most people know the code but it's worth remembering to have a bucket of water close by and a torch. Never go back to a lit firework and don't drink alcohol if you are the person setting off fireworks. Store fireworks in a metal box with a lid on. Site your bonfire with care and check for sleepy wildlife underneath it before you light it.

When Christmas shopping try not to leave presents etc. visible in your car. It is very common for several trips back to the shops to be made. Advice is to ask shops to keep your shopping, if possible, so that theives don't break into the boot if they can't see anything inside. Also, if you're going away over Christmas, don't pack the car the night before and leave it on the drive - the whole lot may be gone in the morning!

It has been known for cars to be stolen on winter mornings when the owner has left it on the drive with the engine running in order to defrost it. If this is you, please be alert.

I have other helpful security tips if anyone is interested, particularly with regard to burglar alarm installation.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

- Highlights from meetings since May

We would like to welcome Mrs Selina Maclennan, who was successfully co-opted onto the Parish Council in May.

The Parish Council now holds the open meeting for the village, every month. Look out for the dates and agendas.

The proposal for the development of Town Farm by Berkeley Homes for the erection of eight 4 bed-roomed homes, went to a Public Enquiry, because of a decision by the South Cambs. District Planning Authority to defer their judgement. The public enquiry was held on Tuesday 3rd October at South Cambs. Hall, Cambridge. The Parish Council's position was presented by Philip Neale at the inquiry, and representations were made on the grounds that:

- the proposed development is too high density with an inappropriate mix of sizes and types of dwellings, which does not reflect local needs.
- the proposed development would be totally out of character with the rest of Whaddon and create unacceptable damage to the centre of the village through increased traffic and car parking.
- The development would be overbearing to local residents.
- there is not the infrastructure in the area or amenities in Whaddon to support such a large increase in population.

We were in full agreement with the District Council and we worked together at the inquiry. It was a very interesting and hard day. Whaddon had a fair hearing and a chance to express the views of the village. Many thanks to all those villagers who attended and particularly those who spoke.

Plans for the frontage development of the Village Hall with gates and railings have now been finalised, and if anyone would like to see the plans, please contact one of your councillors. Many thanks to Clive Hough for his skills in development of the plans.

The plans will now be submitted to District for approval, and costings for the project are being investigated.

The purchase of the fountain and surrounding area, in Bridge Street, is progressing through Limbach Banham, for the sum of £1500. We are still researching the possibility of a grant to help pay for the purchase.

Grass cutting on the verges and recreation ground is carefully monitored. If you have any comments or concerns that this is not being done properly, anywhere in the village, then please contact one of your councillors.

Traffic calming and reduction of speed limits have been discussed with the County Council. There is a move to have a 30 m.p.h. speed limit for all villages in Cambridgeshire and the Council will keep pressing for measures to improve the safety of Whaddon.

The Village Hall fete raised a total of £1231.18p. The Church fete raised a total of £1602.94p. Well done and thank you to everyone who helped with the success of our village fetes.

The Cambridge Evening News published a special profile of Whaddon in their 9th October edition. Many thanks to all those who attended for the photograph.

We are currently without a Community Beat Officer from Cambridgeshire Police.

Hopefully a new one will be appointed soon.
