


Calling all crocheters and knitters of Whaddon

Whaddon Gap road safety scheme

While this work is funded and will definitely go ahead, County Highways are waiting for the entrance to the yard opposite Whaddon Gap to be closed permanently before they can begin work. Closure of this entrance is one of the Planning Conditions imposed upon the developer when permission was granted to build the new houses on the site. The new entrance to the houses will be further to the north and so will not interfere with traffic at the Whaddon junction. Hopefully, we shall not have to wait too long before this scheme is implemented.

Whaddon Parish Council Matters

Covid-19

Although the worst effects of the Pandemic seem to be abating, there are still high Covid numbers in Cambridgeshire. We all must be all continue to practice good hand hygiene and room ventilation, wear masks when appropriate and conduct regular testing, especially before attending events and meeting with others outside your regular household. The Parish Council will continue to send around updates if they are relevant.

Parish Precept for 2022-2023

The Parish Precept is the amount of Council Tax money that the PC needs to effectively 'run' the village. This includes maintenance, grass cutting and small improvements. This year, the Parish Council decided, at our January meeting, that the amount of precept paid by each dwelling will be held at the same rate as last year, typically at £79.88 for a band D rated house.

However, because of a slight increase in the number of village dwellings paying Council Tax this year (for several technical reasons), this gives the PC a slightly bigger overall total budget. Other projects identified are an additional £2,279 for Village Hall and Playground maintenance and renovation and a small budget for a new village recycling scheme, detailed below. Morden. The Parish Council with the cooperation of the Hall and Recreation Ground Trust are to set up a small recycling area for these difficult items at the Village Hall. This is based on a scheme already running in Foxton. SCDC will provide us with two small brown bins that can be used for these items, and the Parish Council has purchased a lock by which they can be attached to the hall. One bin will be initially for blister packs, the other for crisp packets.

It's not terribly environmentally friendly or convenient for each of us individually to drive to these places to drop off our "difficult items", so I have been looking at what other villages are doing to create central drop-off points to make this easier. Foxton has been particularly active. Inspired by this, I have got the agreement of the Parish Council and the Hall and Recreation Ground Trust to set up a small recycling area for these difficult items at the Village Hall. You may have seen this mentioned in the Council minutes.

SCDC have been very generous in agreeing to provide us with two small brown bins that can be used for these items, and the Parish Council has purchased and will install a lock by which they can be attached to the hall. One bin will be initially for blister packs, the other for crisp packets.

All villagers will have to do is go to the Village Hall, drop their items into the correct bin, and then volunteers will sort them out and periodically take them to the appropriate drop-off point. I already have two volunteers but if anyone else is interested, please get in touch.

We will be letting you know when this is up and running, and I very much hope villagers will support this scheme to "do our bit" to cut back on non-recyclable items.

MOBILE LIBRARY

A reminder that the Cambridgeshire County Council's Mobile Library Service is free to join and use. Each Mobile Library vehicle carries up to 3,000 items of stock including fiction, non-fiction, large print, books on CD & cassette and books for children of all ages. You can request books online to collect from the mobile Library on our next visit.

Any books borrowed from the Mobile Library can be returned to any other Cambridgeshire Library and you can return books from other libraries to the mobile service, so no need to worry about missing your due date. TIMES PAST

Royal Celebrations (1)

In this year of Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, Times Past will concentrate on Royal Celebrations in Whaddon. Information, previously researched by Stan and Jean Ralls, will be used along with extracts from articles published by the Royston Crow. Thanks to the *Herts and Cambs Reporter (Royston Crow)* we know that Whaddon has celebrated Royal Occasions over the last 135 years. Actual extracts from the *Royston Crow* appear in italics.

Queen Víctoría

Celebrations, if any, that took place in Whaddon for the Coronation of Queen Victoria on 28th June 1838 or for Her Silver Jubilee in 1862 will probably never be known as there are no reports in the local press.

Golden Jubílee 23rd June 1887

The proceedings commenced with a short service at the Church, after which the choir and a large congregation marched to a field kindly lent by Mr A Coningsby, 'where a bountiful supply of boiled and roast beef with beer, followed by tea, bread and butter and cake were provided for the whole parish. Cricket, scrambling for nuts, with the accompaniment of a troupe of minstrels from Melbourn enlivened the afternoon. Dancing was indulged in until a late hour'.

Díamond Jubílee 25th June 1897

This Jubilee was celebrated through the kindness of Mr and Mrs Palmer. The festivities were again held on Mr Coningsby's ground. 'At 4 o'clock the children were regaled with a meat tea, cake etc., and were each presented with a Jubilee mug. A presentation was made to Mr and Mrs Palmer as a mark of esteem'. A Cricket Match between Married and Singles was played in the afternoon, the Singles winning easily. A string band was provided and dancing 'freely engaged in after tea'. Athletic Sports were arranged including races for women and children and at the close there was a firework display and the National Anthem was sung.

Edward VII


26th June 1902 - planned date for the Coronation

Many arrangements had been made 'for great rejoicings on the Coronation of King Edward VII on Thursday 26th June'. However, on the Tuesday, news was received that His Majesty was seriously ill. The vicar, Rev J G Eames and the Parish Council met on the Wednesday to decide what should be done as the food had already arrived and been prepared. It was decided to go ahead and have the meal as arranged 'in accordance with the King's desire'. A Church Service was held at 11 o'clock led by the Rev J G Eames which was well attended. 'Dinner and tea were served in a large tent erected with hay poles and cloths, kindly lent for the occasion' in the grounds of Mr Alfred Coningsby. 'The Vicar and Mrs Eames and Mr J Beaumont attended at dinner, the Vicar making some suitable remarks on His Majesty's illness'. The programme of sports, fireworks, bonfire and a band was cancelled. A cricket match was played in the afternoon, Married v Single, Singles winning on the second innings. A tug-of-war was also arranged, again Married v Single, but this was won by the Marrieds easily. 'A vote of thanks to Mr Coningsby for the use of his grounds, Mr Nash and others who helped, terminated a very enjoyable day under the circumstances'.

The King had an emergency operation for appendicitis on June 24th. Following the King's recovery the date of the actual Coronation was Saturday 9th August, 1902.

Coronation Day 9th August 1902

The fact that a substantial part of the original programme of Coronation festivities was carried out on June 26th, did not prevent the inhabitants of Whaddon from sharing in the common rejoicings on Saturday, August 9th. Tea was provided for all, and a happy time was spent with amusing sport and fireworks in the evening. The school children were presented with Coronation mugs by the Vicar Rev J G Eames.
